1 in 4 former foster youth become homeless within 2 years of aging out of care²





Mature beyond her age, Nani is determined to be a survivor and a role model for young people.

Growing up, Nani's home life didn't have the safety and stability many people take for granted. She dealt with things no child should ever have to experience, including violence and abuse.

But Nani is determined to thrive despite the hardships she's encountered.

With the help of her B:E coach, Nani has graduated high school, applied for college scholarships, and is studying psychology with the goal of becoming a therapist. Along with taking college classes, Nani works as a youth advocate in Oakland, supporting young people who are in foster care.

"You can use your environment to become something. Don't become a victim of your situation. Choose to be a survivor."





You empowered Jason to go to college!

When you meet Jason, one of the first things you notice is his big heart.

After Jason connected with B:E as a teenager, he finally found the supportive community he craved as a kid. With B:E's support, Jason set goals for school and work and built up the confidence to enroll in college.

"All my life people put me down," Jason shares. "I want to show them what they've missed out on."

Now that he's aged out of foster care, Jason is more driven than ever. On top of enrolling in classes at Laney College, Jason joined student government. He hopes to use his voice to advocate for other young people in the foster care system, especially those with special needs.

"I really want to make an impact in the world. I want people to know that somebody is doing something good."

Briasia entered foster care when she was only a baby. Because of this, she is no stranger to how lonely being a foster youth can feel.

But the sense of community Briasia found at B:E gave her the strength to dream big. With a safe place to call home in B:E housing, Briasia can focus on paving the way to a better future for her and her son.

Briasia works at a local nonprofit, helping people find housing. Her dream is to launch a nonprofit for single parents seeking community support and start a group home for young girls.

Zevin grew up in a home where his basic needs weren't met. While his family did their best, there were periods where his parents just couldn't pay the bills, and they'd be without electricity or heat.

But Zevin was determined to beat the odds. He worked hard and graduated high school this spring. His sights were set on higher education, but college felt out of reach.

Thankfully, through B:E, Zevin received support navigating college applications and financial aid and even earned a B:E scholarship. He's now studying sociology at St. Mary's College and is already dreaming about grad school.
